


For Kenya our school is fairly large we have about 800 students and the average class size is about 50 students. This leads to overcrowding in our cramped computer lab 4 to 5 students gather around one machine and active learning is inhibited. That's why my counterpart came up with the idea to expand and move the computer lab to a larger room. There is a building on campus with an empty room that is perfect for our new computer lab. Currently, it's being used for storage. This grant will fund the finishing of this room and the procurement of new machines. Below is a floor plan proposal drawn up by my counterpart and our school's computer teacher Mr. Anunda:





Below are some photos. On the far left, the main in bright yellow, is St. Monica's computer teacher and my counterpart Mr. Anunda. Mr. Anunda is in charge of designing the new lab and procuring the lab's new hardware. In the middle, the man in pale yellow, is our school's principal Dr. Echessa. Dr. Echessa is in charge of hiring and managing the fundis (aka specialized laborers more on fundis later.) Lastly, the white mzungu, the man in Costanza brown, is me Trevor COX. I will be in charge of bookkeeping and accounting. (What's the difference between bookkeeping and accounting? I have no clue! I just need it to seem like I'm doing a lot of work.) Then we have two photos of the space that will become the computer lab. Right now it is being used for bike storage. What a waste!



Once the grant is fully funded I will receive the money and construction will begin. I will keep you all frequently updated on the lab's progress. Here's a photo from one of our Guidance & Counseling sessions. The man speaking is not the person speaking from either of those vignettes!




The Drunk Crossing Guard ::
